My day to day job is heavily collaborative with partners in India, primarily actually, but I think there's so much, so much we learn from one another by directly knowing each other in an informal way and not necessarily even directly around a project, because that's how we learn, sort of at the side around the context within which we research and work.

So from working with Pam Friday, we I now have a much better understanding of, you know, where he is coming from and other researchers from Nigeria. Some of the challenges that you know, you might face through your education and trying to get jobs and opportunities in the effort that you need to put in. And I think from, I guess, my perspective in many ways, recruiting PhD students, understanding why people have come from in that context actually provides a much broader picture of who might be applying and why.
